

Guidelines for Students – resonans.dmjx.dk

What should be published:

As a rule, all mandatory journalistic assignments must be published. (Not exercises.) You may not publish anything on Resonans that was not produced as part of teaching or exams at DMJX.

Publication:

Your instructor publishes your project on labrador.dmjx.dk.

The instructor publishes work that meets the assignment requirements and does not present ethical or legal challenges.

The instructor does not publish:

- Submissions that have failed or were not approved
- Products that likely contain legal violations or breaches of press ethics
- Extraordinary projects
- Bachelor projects. Students publish these themselves or keep them in "hidden published" mode if they are being (or have been) offered for sale. Unsold projects are published by the study administration six months after the exam.

Projects students wish to sell:

The student contacts the instructor, who keeps the project in "hidden published" mode. The student is responsible for following up with the instructor at the agreed time to inform whether the project should be published on Resonans.

If a project cannot be published, it will remain in the dashboard under: Submitted for feedback.

Front page:

Your instructor sends three to four suggestions for front-page stories to the editorial team at resonans@dmjx.dk.

Assessment:

The layout aspect of the assignment – i.e., the presentation on Resonans – is now also part of the assessment and must be included in the evaluation criteria. Therefore, you must submit a screenshot of your project as it appears on the site, along with the rest of your submission.

Changes:

You may not make any changes to your product on resonans.dmjx.dk before receiving feedback/grades. Doing so will be considered cheating.

Sharing published projects:

You may only share the link to your project on Resonans with external parties once the project has been graded and published.
